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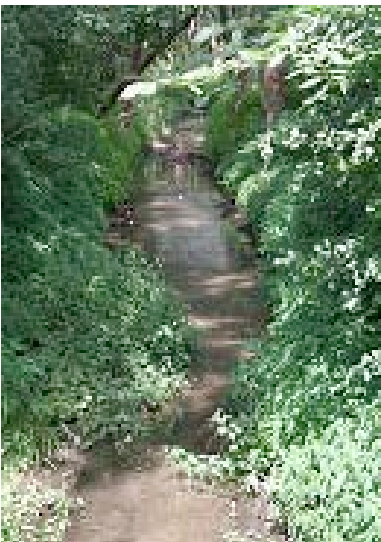


A Message from the KNC Chairman

Mid-way through 2007 we are very happy with the progress we are making at Kishwauketoe Nature Conservancy. We have had a good volunteer turnout at our monthly workdays, the second Saturday of the month. We also enjoyed a very successful Earth Day Celebration the last Saturday in April. Our special event was a seminar by Chris Heeter of the Wild Institute. We would like to thank Aurora University- George Williams College and Williams Bay Park and Recreation District for her spending Earth Day with us.

This summer we have five interns and volunteers working various days of the week keeping our restoration work on pace. We are extremely pleased to have Christine Register now on our staff on a year round part time basis. Chrissy is a graduate of the University of Wyoming with a degree in Agroecology with a minor in Horticulture. Chrissy is the Horticulture Educator and Associate Lecturer with the University of Wisconsin-Extension in Walworth County.

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Southwick Creek Restoration Activities

In 2006, we started the first phase of a long term program to restore Southwick Creek to a condition where it can once again support a reproducing population of trout. During this past year we made substantial progress including the extension of the trail along the creek to provide further access and the removal of invasive species of plants and trees along the east side of the creek and trail. This was accomplished with the support of our summer intern staff and hundreds of volunteer hours.

In 2007 and 2008, as funds become available, we plan to complete the clearing

of invasive species along the west bank of the creek. When this is accomplished, both sides of the creek will be planted with native American ground cover including wildflowers, grasses, legumes and sedges. Along the trail on the east side of the bank, we intend to plant at least a dozen strands or groupings of native American trees and shrubs.

You are all invited to take a relaxing walk along this unique, beautiful waterway.

KNC Chairman Receives Award

On December 2, 2006 Harold Friestad received the Conservation Stewardship Award from the Geneva Lake Conservancy.

Friestad is an active and outspoken member of the community . As a current advisory board member of the Geneva Lake Conservancy and the chairman of the Kishwauketoe Nature Conservancy, Friestad has presided over the rescue of Kishwauketoe from a massive housing development. He has helped organize volunteers and employees alike to preserve the fragile wetland and shoreland that is visited by many people through out the area.

The conservancy was purchased under the direction of Friestad when he served as the village president from 1987-1992. Since then he has logged hundreds of hours coordinating volunteers to beautify the fragile ecosystem. Some of the projects include; prairie restoration, boardwalk construction, Southwick Creek restoration and building a network of hiking trails.

Friestad continues to devote his time and resources to the conservancy for future generations to come.

In this capacity she develops and implements horticulture programs to the community, leads the Master Gardener initial and advanced education training classes, facilitates groups to improve gardening techniques and invasive species control. 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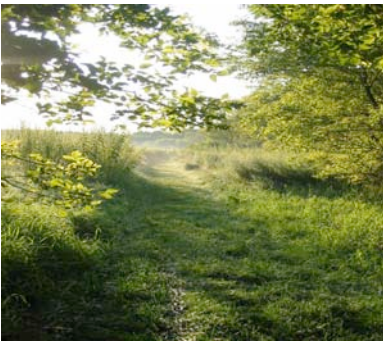
